So come on out next Friday and get ready to paint Great Falls pink with pride!

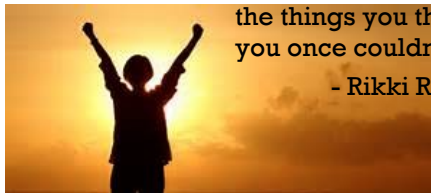

On September 28th, Hurricane Matthew reared its ugly head, and the effects of its devastation are definitely evident.

It was the worst hurricane since Hurricane Felix in 2007. The death toll has risen to 38 in the United States and over 1000 in Haiti.

The country of Haiti has even had to revert to mass graves to bury the victims. The 145 mph winds tore the roofs off houses and left the small West Indies country in economic turmoil.

"I'm deeply saddened about what happened," said Robbie Yarbrough, "they live in despair, and

what little they had is gone."

According to an article by The Washington Post reporters Chico Harlan and Angela Fritz, Lumberton, a town in North Carolina, is experiencing massive flooding from the hurricane. Out of the 38 deaths in the United States, this town accounts for 19 of them. Flood waters are coming from the rapid rising of the Lumber River, which has flooded to almost 20.7 inches.

"It reminds me of Hurricane Floyd in 1989," said Michael Bradley. "the flooding was massive. It's very similar to what hap-

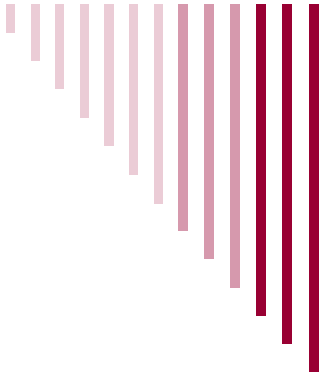

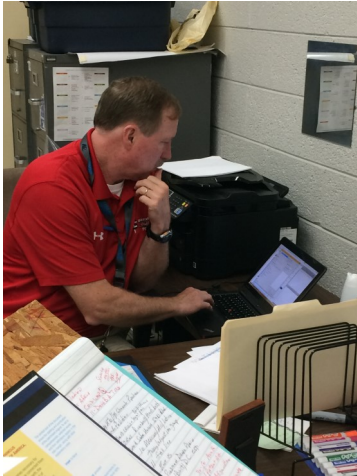

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From big to small, Mr. Bradley tells all

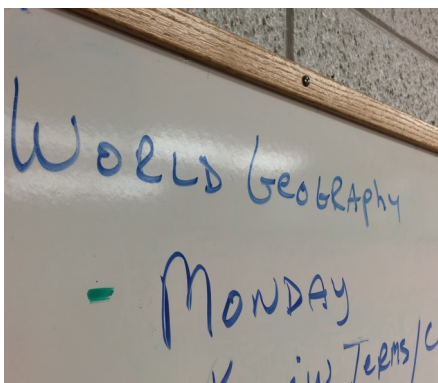


